#### Keeping up with Society News

The following news from AAHS is presented so you, our members, are included in "behind the scenes" work and updates the AAHS Board of Directors (Board) has to report this year. My hope is that these updates help you keep in touch with your society.

#### Looking Forward to an Updated Website

AAHS is in the process of updating our website through a contract with Ian Johnson, Lead Developer, with Ian Crombie, as Lead Designer. The goals of the new website are for it to be more easily accessible, to be more visually pleasing, to work well both on a computer and a smartphone, with clear entry points to the wealth of posted information. The AAHS website



(https://www.az-arch-and-hist.org/) is the society's main online presence. It includes announcements of society events-lectures, field trips, grant award deadlines and associated applications, newly published video interviews, access to publications, and much more. It also archives a great deal of information, including: previous society awardees, educational materials, past lectures and field trips, access to Roots of Southwestern Archaeology Oral History Interviews, and articles about the history of the society.

The process of updating the website has gone through many levels, from board member reviews of a variety of websites, preparing summaries of what we found that works well on other sites, creating a proposal to solicit contracts and then choosing one to now ongoing discussions and reviews with "the Ians." Our contracted group, MoiaGroup (ian@moiagroup.com), is taking our input and designing an update that includes less text on initial contact and more photographs in an effort to entice people to visit the website and

learn about AAHS. The updated site will present upcoming activities clearly and will make it easier for members to access information, renew memberships, access *Kiva* and *Glyphs*, visit the online store, and become involved in society activities. We are excited about the changes and are looking forward to an updated presence on the web!

#### **Mission Statement and Updates**

There have been discussions by the Board over many years about updating our practices to improve diversity, equity, and inclusion. The Board is making headway on these changes. Board members are currently updating the *Operations Manual* with changes voted on over the past two years. Those changes include, among others: offering an honorarium of \$250 per presentation for monthly meeting lectures, allowing the AAHS Student Representative to apply for Research and Travel Grants, which was previously restricted, increasing maximum amounts for some grants, and reimbursement of certain society expenses to reflect current costs and support wider participation.

Further, AAHS has clear objectives, but the society does not have a stated mission nor statement of purpose or values that drive our practice. The Board has recognized a need to bring together the Board and society members to recommend updates needed to the AAHS Bylaws and *Operations Manual* in this area. We are considering facilitated meeting(s) to help us create a mission statement, as well as statements of purpose or values that provide guidelines for the society. These will define updates we will make to our Bylaws and our *Operations Manual*.

#### **Responses to COVID-19**

AAHS has extended the time allotted for certain grant awardees whose research was delayed by restrictions related to COVID-19. Requests for extensions have been received and approved as delays were outside awardees' control.

During the height of the pandemic, AAHS moved all meetings to virtual and drafted a masking policy for in-person at ENR2 events once those began again. We hosted one monthly lecture, May 2022,

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in a hybrid format from the University of Arizona, Environmental and Resources 2 Building (ENR2), Agnese Nelms Haury Lecture Hall, Room 107. The following month, a new COVID-19 wave forced us to return to virtual meetings. The Board decided to return to virtual only until the end of the current fiscal year, June 2023.

Beginning in September 2023, meetings will once again be hybrid. Members and others can attend in-person, while others an access the AAHS monthly presentations virtually. Participation in monthly lectures has greatly increased during the virtual and hybrid presentations, allowing participation from outside the Tucson area, as well as for those with restricted mobility. Thanks to changes we needed to make, we now have many more attendees at our monthly meetings and lectures. Further, we are bringing together members and others interested in the anthropology and history of the U.S. Southwest from throughout the Southwest, as well as from many other states in the U.S., Mexico, and Canada, and also occasionally from European countries. With the technology available to us, we can continue the expanded access and meet together in Tucson in-person!

#### **Archiving AAHS Documents**

AAHS is excited to announce a new volunteer AAHS Archivist, Beth Grindell. Beth is helping us update society archives at the Arizona State Museum (ASM). AAHS has archived society records since 1916, when it was founded. I understand there are some amazing photographs and announcements in the archives from the early days of the society! As required by the AAHS Bylaws, AAHS is responsible for regularly archiving summaries of activities, legal paperwork, copies of *Kiva*, *Kiva* contracts, editorial correspondence, and manuscript materials, award recipients, copies of *Glyphs*, extra copies of *Glyphs*, membership files, financial information, and boxes of photographs. As you can imagine, printing and organizing all of these materials is a difficult job to maintain, and we are happy to have Beth coordinating this daunting task for us.

## Revised F. Lewis Orrell Jr. Bequest Curriculum Development Award

The F. Lewis Orrell Jr. Curriculum Development Awards for public K-12 schools have been on hold during COVID-19. An award was given to Arizona Project Archaeology to develop an O'odham Pithouse Shelter Guide when schools were closed due to COVID-19, but it is time to get back to offering awards to K-12 schools. The committee recently recruited new committee members and revised the application timeline and process. Look to our new website soon for ideas for cultural education for K-12 students designed by previous Orrell Jr. grant awardees, as well as links to other available curricular materials. Young people who receive authentic cultural education will be the AAHS members of tomorrow, and they are critical to the preservation, research, and education goals supported by the society.



# June 19: Topic of the General Meeting

#### Between Casas Grandes and Salado: The Establishment of an Indigenous Borderland in the Late Prehispanic American Southwest/ Mexican Northwest

Beginning September 2023, AAHS monthly lectures will be held at the University of Arizona, ENR2, Room 107 and simultaneously broadcast through Zoom.

Thile archaeologists continue to investigate processes of culture contact and frontier construction in hunter-gatherer and small agricultural societies using models originally created for, or applied to, ancient states and modern geopolitical discourse, historians have recently begun investigating Indigenous borderlands. In this talk, I present my investigation into several spatially restricted culture areas along the United States-Mexico border, including what archaeologists widely perceive to be a northern extension of the Casas Grandes culture, one of the most sociopolitically complex entities in the ancient American Southwest/Mexican Northwest. In so doing, I challenge prevailing interpretations of southeastern Arizona, southwestern New Mexico, northeastern Sonora, and northwestern Chihuahua, advocate the need for a more nuanced understanding of Indigenous power and transformation in a lesser studied portion of the American Southwest/Mexican Northwest, and provide insight into the potential for collections-based research to greatly improve historically underevaluated portions of the American Southwest/Mexican Northwest.

This lecture is free and open to the public, but you must pre-register at: https://bit.ly/2023JuneRogersREG Speaker Thatcher Seltzer-Rogers is a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Anthropology at the University of New Mexico, the President of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico, a Research Associate with the Jornada Research Institute, and a Crew Chief for Aspen CRM Solutions. Mr. Seltzer-Rogers is a specialist in the archaeology of the southern American Southwest/ Mexican Northwest region with an emphasis on the construction and transformation of Indigenous borderlands. He has published extensively on the



*region in* American Antiquity, Kiva, Journal of Anthropological Archaeology, Journal of Arizona Archaeology, *and* Pottery Southwest, *as well as nearly 100 technical contributions and book chapters*.

#### UPCOMING AAHS FIELD TRIPS

#### Historic Logging, Railroads, and the Development of Grand Canyon Village June 17–18, 2023

Join AAHS for a 2-day, in-depth tour of historic sites in northern Arizona, from Flagstaff to Grand Canyon Village. State Park Rangers, U.S. Forest Service Archeologists, Grand Canyon National Park Historical Architects, and Northern Arizona University (NAU)

Archaeology Field School Director and graduate students will provide insights to sites in northern Arizona. Highlights include a tour of the historic Milton site in Flagstaff by Riordan Mansion State Park Rangers, stops in the Coconino and Kaibab National Forests with forest archeologists<sup>1</sup>, a visit to an active historical archaeology field school directed by NAU, and a tour by Grand Canyon Historical Architects of the development and history of the Grand Canyon and the Grand Canyon Village National Historic Landmark District. This includes stops at El Tovar, Hopi House, the Livery Stables, Mule Barn, Grand Canyon Railroad Depot, and the NHL powerhouse.

The fee to Arizona State Parks for

the Milton Tour is \$16 per person. Participants who do not have an America the Beautiful pass or other public lands pass will be required to pay admission at Grand Canyon National Park. Admission to the Grand Canyon is \$35 and is good for seven days. It includes both the

North Rim and South Rim. Grand Canyon Annual Passes and America the Beautiful passes are available at the park entrance station.

The trip is limited to 20 people. Participants are responsible for entrance fees, meals, and accommodations. To sign up for the trip, or for more information, email aahs1916@gmail.com.


